**Hot Tub** means a hot tub, whirlpool, hydro massage pool, or spa (as per Section 1) – does not include swim spas.

Your application should include the following:         <ul> <li>Site plan that indicates where the hot tub is located, where all sheds and decks are (whether existing or to be built in the future). Hot tub location requirements The location of your hot tub will need to follow these guidelines and be clearly indicated in your site plan: <ul> <li>1.5 metres (5 feet) away from property line</li> <li>0.6 metres (2 feet) away from property line for structures, walkways, patios and decks. Corner lots may have different requirements.</li> <li>Away from surface water drainage ditch/swales</li> <li>If installed on a deck higher than 0.6 metres above grade, the hot tub must be located 0.9 metres (3 feet) from the deck railing. If the hot tub is located less than 0.9 metres (3 feet) from the railing, the required railing height is based on distance from grade to the hot tub lid.</li> <li>If the distance from grade to the hot tub lid does not exceed 5 feet 11 inches, the railing shall be at least 35 inches above the hot tub lid.</li> <li>If the distance from grade to the hot tub lid exceeds 5 feet 11 inches, the railing shall be at least 42 inches above the hot tub lid.</li> </ul> </li> </ul>	Section 4(c) Section 4(c) Section 4(c) Section 4(d) and Building Code

## Maintenance requirements

- 1. Homeowner shall ensure hot tub cover is secured and locked at all unsupervised times.
- 2. Every owner shall ensure that all hot tub equipment, covers, safety equipment signage and all other items required under the By-law are:
  - i. Maintained in such condition that they are structurally sound;
  - ii. Operational and able to perform their intended functions; and are
  - iii. Inspected annually by the Owner.
