Outdoor Swimming Pool Inspection Checklist – for Homeowners



Note: Applies to permits applied for after May 27, 2019

Pool means an artificial outdoor body of water, including a swimming pool, capable of containing water at least 0.6 m deep, but does not include:

- i. A pond used only for an ornamental, agricultural, horticultural or industrial purpose, for stormwater retention, or as a reservoir for firefighting,
- ii. A pond located in an agricultural zone, or
- iii. A swimming pool or hot tub which is subject to the Ontario Building Code (as per Section 1)

Temporary fencing requirements A temporary fence is required when a pool fence is not yet in place (ie. before installing an aboveground pool and prior to excavating for an in-ground pool) 1. Fences are only to be removed for construction access during normal work hours, and must be reinstalled at the end of each work day 2. Temporary fences are only acceptable for a maximum of four weeks, unless otherwise approved in writing by an inspector. 3. Temporary fences must be constructed of prefabricated interlocking steel fence sections or metal chain link fencing that is securely attached to posts that are no more than 2.4 metres (8 feet) apart and at least 1.5 metres (5 feet) tall. Fencing must be supported at the top and bottom to prevent sagging or lifting. 4. If pool is in place without a fence, it must always have a functioning non-penetrable safety pool cover that complies with ASTM F1346-91 (2018) Standard Performance Specification for Safety Covers and Labelling Requirements for All Covers for Swimming Pools, Spas and Hot Tubs. Pool fence gate guidelines Your fence must have at least one gate that is self-closing and self-latching with the mechanism located on the pool side (exceptions allowed for townhouses where a gate cannot be installed) Gates follow the same regulations as the regular fence (see item E above) If the latch release mechanism of the self-latching device is less than 1.4 metres (4.5 feet) from the bottom of the gate, it must have a latch-release mechanism that is at least 75 millimetres (3 inches) below the top of the gate on the side of the gate facing the pool If the latch release mechanism on the self-latching device is 1.4 metres (4.5 feet) or more from the bottom of the gate, it must have a latch-release mechanism that is on the gate facing the pool Has no opening within 0.45 metres (1.5 feet) from the latch release that is greater than 12 millimetres (0.5 inches) in width Gate must be clear of any obstructions at all times that could hold the gate open The gate is secure and when lifted or pulled on does not: a) activate the latch release mechanism, b) come off its hinges, or c) expose a ground clearance greater than 100 millimetres (3.9 inches) Gate must be locked at all times unless an adult is supervising the use of the pool If you have or are installing a double gate: a) One side of the double gate must meet all the above requirements 	Sections 18, 19(a) to (i)

Every fire egress window in the house wall which provides direct access through to the pool is: a) Equipped with a secure screen or a compliant audible alarm, and b) Not equipped with a device that limits its initial opening width. 5. Electrical installations for the pool must pass inspection Your pool must pass a final inspection report for all electrical installations by the Electrical Safety Authority (ESA) and be submitted to a City inspector. YES	NO □	L. Storage of pool chemicals Pool chemicals are to be stored in a safe, ventilated and locked container, or in a building out of the reach of children (Eg. locked shed)	Section 28
YES	NO	M. Safety rules signage Your pool must have a safety rules sign approved by the Pool and Hot Tub Council of Canada (P.H.T.C.C.) that is permanently placed in a visible location near the pool. P.H.T.C.C. safety rules signage can be purchased from your local pool and hot tub company.	Section 29(a)

Notes for Homeowners:

- a) Owner shall ensure pool fence gates are locked at all unsupervised times.
- b) Owner shall ensure supervision of a pool, when in use, by a responsible person who is 18 years of age or older or is at least 16 years of age and is a qualified lifeguard according to the Life Saving Society of Canada.
- c) All water from a Pool shall discharge to a sanitary sewer system (i.e. laundry tub, floor drain, et cetera) in accordance with the City's Sewer Use By-law, and not discharge:
 - i. Onto any adjacent property,
 - ii. Into any stream, river, pond, ditch or lake, or
 - iii. Directly into a storm sewer system.
- d) Owner shall ensure that all Fences, Gates, House Walls, Pool and Hot Tub equipment, covers and all associated access devices, controls, safety equipment and signage, and all other items required under the By-law are:
 - i. Maintained in such condition that they are structurally sound;
 - ii. Operational and able to perform their intended functions; and
 - iii. Inspected annually by the Owner
- e) Every Owner who intends to have an **in-ground** Pool (including on-ground pools installed in the ground) permanently removed shall: before such removal, obtain the applicable permit from the City for such removal; and during the removal, comply with all requirements of the permit.
